Main Presentation: Proxmox

With the recent acquisition of VMWare by Broadcom, many are looking for an alternative to closed source hypervisors. Wyatt Zacharias has previously presented on Linux



KVM virtualization, but without a management layer it can be clunky to use. Proxmox offers a fully featured web based administration suite for KVM. It includes support for multi-host clusters, live migration, clustered filesystems, and more. Wyatt will give a tour of the Proxmox interface with a possible demo of VMWare to Proxmox migration.

Father of SQL says YES to NoSQL

Sometimes your own invention just isn't enough anymore

As **SQL** marks its 50th birthday, Donald Chamberlin, who proposed the SQL language with IBM colleague Raymond Boyce back in 1974, explains in an interview that NoSQL databases and their query languages could help perform the tasks relational systems were never designed for.

"The world doesn't stay the same thing, especially in computer science," he says. "It's a very fast, evolving, industry. New requirements are coming along and technology has to change to meet them, I think that's what's happening. The NoSQL movement is motivated by new kinds of applications, particularly web applications, that need massive scalability and high performance. Relational databases were developed in an earlier generation when scalability and performance weren't quite as important. To get the scalability and performance that you need for modern apps, many systems are relaxing some of the constraints of the relational data model."

NoSQL takes a variety of forms, each designed to address different challenges. Some forms include MongoDB, Couchbase, and Amazon's DynamoDB.

Chamberlin is now semi-retired, but finds time to fulfill a role as a technical advisor for NoSQL company Couchbase. [Hmm....]

Cleaning Crew Discovers One of the World's Oldest Surviving Desktop Computers



Last December, employees at a London-based house clearance company, were emptying a property when they stumbled across two rare pieces of technology history: a 1972 Q1 desktop

microcomputer and a 1976 Q1 Lite.

The Q1 and the Q1 Lite originally sold for upwards of \$90,000 each, making them too expensive for individual use.

"The Q1's champagne customer was NASA, and Q1 Lites were installed in all 11 NASA bases in 1974."

Over the past decade, similarly rare relics of computer history have gone under the hammer at auction houses around the world. In 2022, a prototype of Apple's first computer, the Apple 1, sold for \$677,196; in 2023, a fully operational Apple 1 signed by company co-founder Steve Wozniak fetched \$223,520. However, these 1972 era Q1 microcomputers are only expected to fetch up to \$60,000 at auction. Still not a bad haul!

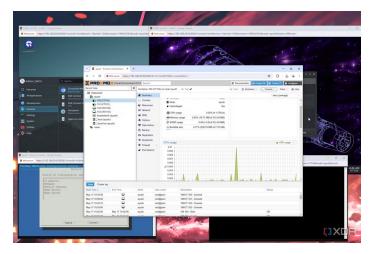

To go along with this month's meeting presentation, follow along with PC hardware and gaming journalist, Ayush Pande, as he builds himself a Proxmox server.

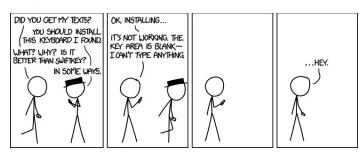

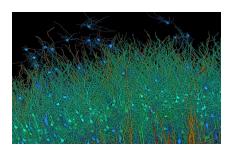
Improved Android Keyboard

A scan of 1 cubic millimeter of brain tissue takes 1.4 petabytes of data



A recent attempt to fully map a mere cubic millimeter of a human brain took up 1.4 petabytes of storage just in pictures of the specimen.

A collaborative effort between Harvard researchers and Google AI experts took the deepest dive yet into neural mapping with the recent full imaging and mapping of the brain sample, making puzzling discoveries and utilizing incredible technology.

"We did the back-of-napkin math on what ramping up this experiment to the entire brain would cost, and the scale is impossibly large—1.6 zettabytes of storage costing \$50 billion and spanning 140 acres, making it the largest data center on the planet."

Linus Torvalds Injects Tabs To Thwart Kconfig Parsers Not Correctly Handling Them

Don't challenge the Father of Linux to humble your opinion that spaces are better than tabs.

Within the release of Linux 6.9-rc4 (released on April 14th) is an interesting little nugget by Linus Torvalds to battle Kconfig parsers that can't correctly handle tabs (they were just assuming spaces for whitespace for this kernel configuration format).

Due to a patch having been queued to replace a tab with a space character in the kernel tracing Kconfig file, Linus Torvalds decided to take matters into his own hand for Kconfig parsers that can't deal with tabs: Torvalds authored a patch to intentionally add some tabs of his own into Kconfig for throwing off any out-of-tree/third-party parsers that can't correctly handle them.

Linus Torvalds on Security, Al, Open Source and Trust



Linux creator Linus Torvalds sat down on April 17th for a rare "keynote interview" at the Linux Foundation's **Open Source Summit** North America in Seattle. Torvalds was interviewed by Dirk Hohndel, an early Linux contributor (and currently the head of Verizon's Open Source program office) — in what was billed as a "fireside chat"

Hohndel: "We all know kernel development does include a lot of drama and a lot of high-stakes discussions... For example, a really important topic that once again has reared its ugly head is tabs versus spaces."

Torvalds: "Oh, Christ..."
